

Lesson 41

Teacher Instructions

Read the words in **bold** out loud to your learner.



Today, you will learn about a new sound. Sometimes, two letters work together to make one sound.

(point to *nd*)

These two letters, *n* and *d*, work together to make the sound *nd*.

You hear the *nd* sound at the end of the word *land*.

Say the word *land*. What sound do you hear at the end? (pause for the child to answer)

That's right! *Nd* makes the *nd* sound.

Say the *nd* sound three times: *nd, nd, nd* (point to the *nd* each time)

(point to *nt*)

These two letters, *n* and *t*, work together to make the sound *nt*.

You hear the *nt* sound at the end of the word *plant*.

Say the word *plant*. What sound do you hear at the end? (pause for the child to answer)

That's right! *Nt* makes the *nt* sound.

Say the *nt* sound three times: *nt, nt, nt* (point to the *nt* each time)



Practice reading these words. Point to each word as you read it.



Point to each word as you read the sentences.



The words *wand* and *want* are memory words. That means they breaks the rules and you need to remember them.

(point to the sound *w*)

The *w* doesn't break the rules.

(point to the sounds *nd* and *nt*)

The *nt* and the *nt* don't break the rules.

(point to the *a*)

But the *a* does break the rules. What sound does *a* usually make? (pause for your child to answer)

That's right! *A* usually makes the sound *aaa* like the first sound in *apple*.

But in the words *wand* and *want*, the *a* makes the sound *ah*, like the first sound in *awesome*.

Because it breaks the rules, you can remember the words *wand* and *want*.



After the Lesson:
